

## Harmony Day Poster and Song Writing Competitions Prizegiving Ceremony

This ceremony, to reward students from all over the state for their excellent posters and songs on the theme of "Harmony, it's up to us", took place on the afternoon of June 19 in the theatrette of Parliament House Macquarie St. Speakers included: the Premier of NSW, Gladys Berejiklian MLA; Nell Lynes Leader, Multicultural Education in the NSW Department of Education; Christopher Sullivan, the Deputy Official Secretary to the Governor of NSW who read a message from the Governor of NSW, the Honourable Margaret Beazley AO QC; Dr Marjorie O'Neill MP, Member for Coogee, representing the Acting Leader of the Opposition Penny Sharpe MLC; our own Ernie Friedlander and, perhaps

most importantly, our State Wide winners: Song Writing Competition State winner ; Poster Competition State Junior Section winner, and Poster Competition State Senior Section winner.

Students travelled from as far afield as Wilcannia in the west and Bega in the south to attend. Each prize-winning poster was projected on the large screen as the awardees received their prize. Third and second placegetters in the song writing competition performed their songs live and the state winner put together a wonderful video of a performance of the song.

The large audience found the sincerity and beauty of the posters and songs and the messages they conveyed simply breathtaking. The 45 who received certificates and awards on the day are only the tip of the iceberg – throughout the state there were nearly 4000 student poster artists and 90 student composers who all thought deeply about harmony in our society and expressed their feelings in art and song.


After the ceremony the winners, their parents and teachers and the members of Moving Forward Together enjoyed refreshments and conversation together in the foyer.




State Senior Winner poster






NSW Premier Gladys Berejiklian personally presented awards to the primary and secondary individual and school winners at a reception last month at NSW Parliament House, which Friedlander said "left wonderful memories ... in what was a most uplifting event".


"[The students'] expressions on this year's theme – Harmony is Up to Us – were extremely well-executed."

The schools category was won by St Therese's, a community school in remote Wilcannia that has just 29, mostly Indigenous, students.

The annual Harmony Day competitions aim to develop and celebrate creativity in school students, motivated by a desire to work towards a more peaceful and inclusive society.











## St Theresa's Community School, Wilcannia

St Therese's is a small school in remote Wilcannia. The school, formerly known as the 'Mission School' has an enrolment of 29 students most of whom are of the Paakantji People.

To encourage engagement and high achievement the school the introduced Stronger Smarter program- students are grouped across stages into small learning groups for History, Geography, Science and the Arts.

This term we have been exploring different ways to create collage – each student decorated a felt hand shape to represent themselves. In the next session they used sewing techniques to create a 3D person.

After we saw the poster competition for Harmony Day it was decided that we could incorporate our work into a 'Poster' that represents that we are individuals, each with our own unique 'style' but together we make a special community where we each have a responsibility to work together to live in harmony and 'BE STRONG – SMART and DEADLY

We hope you will consider our community entry.


